3:15 pm – 4:30 pm	Plenary: Moving Mountains: Strategies for Promoting Systems Change
Description	Bureaucracies are, by design, resistant to new ideas, innovation, and change. Grant programs that seek to promote new promising practices and the integration of services and systems for persons with multiple disabilities often encounter significant, system-level roadblocks to success that frustrate creative thinking and prevent the implementation of new models for treatment, housing and supportive services designed to stimulate recovery and increase independence in the community. More frequently than most of us might care to admit, system-level gaps and barriers contribute to client frustration, provider burnout and "failures" for which blame is incorrectly placed on consumers and/or care providers, rather than on the shortcomings of the systems themselves.





This plenary session will offer a new model for defining human service delivery systems and understanding the process of systems change. The building blocks of systems change will be outlined, and specific strategies for engaging in system change initiatives will be examined. Participants will have the opportunity to work in small groups to explore in detail different components of strategic thinking required to stimulate real and lasting change.

	Formative Evaluation: What It Is and How to Do It
Description	Grantees are required to include a formative evaluation in their work plan. The purpose of formative evaluation – also called process or implementation evaluation – is to learn what works and does not work (and why) in order to successfully implement and sustain grant initiatives. It is a method that can include informal feedback as well as formal processes for policy analysis and the collection and analysis of data.
	This session will discuss the type of information that can be collected as part of formative evaluation, including data states already collect for existing programs, data from pilots or new programs, and an analysis of statutory or regulatory changes needed to bring about systems change. It will also discuss how to communicate findings and outcomes to key stakeholders, including state policymakers and CMS, and how this information will be used in the larger formative evaluation of the entire Systems Change Grants Program

	Supporting Family Caregivers
Description	Family and informal caregivers provide the vast majority of support and direct care to persons of all ages with disabilities. This workshop will discuss various programs supporting these caregivers from both a systems and a care giver's perspective. The session will present findings from the first national study examining publicly-funded family caregiver support services in all 50 states. The study focuses on aged/disabled Medicaid waiver programs and family caregiving, as well a commonalities and differences between waiver and other state programs to support family caregivers. It will also cover state approaches to offering consumer-directed options for caregiving families. Additionally, the mother of an 18 year old daughter with special health care needs will share first hand how critical supporting family caregiving is for day-to-day living.
